A few days ago, one of my students and I read from Luke 5. In this chapter, we studied Jesus' brief encounter with Levi, his invitation for Levi to follow him, and Levi's acceptance. The scene changes to Levi's house in the following verses. There, Levi holds a dinner in which many people representing different social classes attend. These people include tax collectors, Jesus and his disciples, Pharisees, and many others. My student pointed out something I had never noticed before. First, Jesus extends an invitation to Levi, but later, Levi extends an invitation to Jesus by welcoming him into his home and by introducing him to the people in his life. We spent some time with this thought, discussing the significance behind these parallel events. I sometimes wonder who benefits more from these language sessions, me or my students. The Bible School in Scandicci is a place that always has people coming in and out of its doors. When thinking back on last month's events the impact of inviting others in and showing them hospitality has been made apparent in a number of ways. Here, we are not only blessed to have a space in which we can meet with people, but even more, we are also blessed to see the gospel taking root in people's lives.

Monday Night Bible Study

Our Monday night Bible Study is currently reading the book "Not a Fan" by Kyle Idleman in which Idleman poses difficult questions about how believers view Christ. Do we approach Jesus as over-enthused 'fans' or surrendered 'followers'? We start the study altogether and then break off into smaller groups with the Avanti workers sharing the responsibilities of leading the discussion. Each week draws a different group of people, but whether they are our current readers, former contacts, or American study abroad students, we welcome all participation.

Teaching

Monday through Wednesday I continue to meet with 5 women for one-on-one sessions after I return home from Italian Language School. These women range from ages 14 to mid-60s and are learning English for a variety of reasons. Lorena, for example, has a son-in-law who speaks only English. Estar, on the other hand, is in Junior High School and wants the language practice to reinforce the English she is learning in school. Since my students have different motivations for learning English, I individualize the lessons I have with each of them. Specifically structuring each lesson to meet the language needs and goals of the students requires a good amount of planning, but the time and preparation I invest always pays off. It helps establish an environment in which it is very natural to serve and create relationships.

About Avanti Italia

The missions program I am a part of is called Avanti Italia (A.I.). This mission program has three primary goals: 1. to use our individual talents in sharing the Good News of Jesus the Christ with those who are seeking to have a more perfect relationship with Him, 2. to learn to share Christ with others more effectively, and 3.to participate in mutual encouragement and edification with the Italian churches of Christ. Their method for achieving these goals is mainly through outreach in teaching private Bible lessons in English. As a part of A.I., I would be expected to teach an average of 10-15 Bible lessons a week. Much of the work A.I. encourages would be described as friendship evangelism, making relationships with people and sharing God's saving message with them. Each team member is not only expected to fulfill their obligations, but also to find ways of using his or her individual talents to make more contacts with people. Most of the work is centered at the Florence Bible School in Scandicci, a suburb on the southwest side of Florence. A.I. has had an extensive outreach since its beginning in 1986. Every year, A.I. forms teams of 3-7 members to send to work at the school for a two-year commitment. Team members are required to fundraise, acquire a student visa, and go through intensive training before leaving the United States. Once arriving in Florence, team members live together at the Florence Bible School and immediately begin Italian language studies while teaching English using the Bible. Teachers generally work in one-to-one or small group sessions.
